At the 61st Defence Services Commander-in-Chief's Trophy Tatmadaw (Army, Navy and Air) Football Tournament 2024, the Central Command team and the Yangon Command team opened attacks in controlling football bilaterally as both teams were powerful enough to play the final match. United Nations reports and discussions on Myanmar should acknowledge Myanmar's constructive endeavours

DURING the 57th Session of the Human Rights Council, which was convened recently in Geneva, the unfavourable interactive dialogues on the report of the Independent Investigative Mechanism for Myanmar (IIMM) and the report of the High Commissioner for Human Rights were held on 9 September and 24 September 2024, respectively, in the absence of the country concerned, Myanmar. In 2024 alone, the Council has organized a total of six discussions targeting Myanmar. These discussions do not contribute to the development of Myanmar while exhausting the time and resources of the United Nations.

Since the mandate of the IIMM has stemmed from a politicized country-specific resolution that did not attain a consensus among the members, Myanmar has never acknowledged or accepted the mechanism since its inception. It is observed that the conclusions of the IIMM's report are drawn from unreliable sources. In addition, the vague modalities of IIMM, including unlimited terms, absence of supervision, and reliance on funds outside the regular budget, make its independence, impartiality, and objectivity questionable.

Since the report of the High Commissioner relies on unverified and misleading information, it fosters mistrust between Myanmar and the international community. Regarding the allegations of treatment of prisoners and mental health, the Myanmar National Human Rights Commission has been conducting prison visits since 2021, offering recommendations on prison conditions and treatment of prisoners. Myanmar has also taken steps to address mental health issues through the implementation of a Mental Health Policy and Strategic Plan for Mental Health (2021-2024). The plan aims for a comprehensive approach to providing mental healthcare, both in hospitals and within communities.

The report also fails to verify allegations and neglects publicly available information provided by the government. The report particularly waters down the violence committed by PDF and various armed groups while focusing disproportionately on Tatmadaw's countermeasures despite following Rules of Engagement and domestic laws. Myanmar urges the United Nations and the international community to refrain from supporting the acts of terrorist groups and to cooperate with the government in combatting terrorism and preventing terrorist acts.

As the government is committed to the implementation of the Five-Point Roadmap, the successful launch of the nationwide population and household census on 1 October 2024 marks a significant step towards holding free and fair elections. The government ensures that all available assistance reaches the needy population without any discrimination. All secured areas are granted access to UN agencies and international organizations for the provision of humanitarian aid. The government has been coordinating with the UN agencies to provide relief assistance to disaster-affected areas and facilitate the participation of donors in the distribution process.

The government has been deepening cooperation with the United Nations, particularly in the area of humanitarian assistance. Last August, Myanmar received the delegation of the United Nations Emergency Directors Group (EDG) from New York. Moreover, the government held two meetings with the UN agencies in 2024 on its policies and challenges in cooperation.

It is high time the United Nations acknowledged the unwavering efforts towards peace, stability, and democratization of Myanmar. Myanmar calls on the United Nations to end these repetitive mechanisms and foster constructive cooperation to address the challenges the country is facing rather than obstructing its development with redundant and duplicate mechanisms.

In the evening, he watched the fundraising charity show for flood victims organized by the Myanmar Music Association (Central) at the National Theatre in Yangon.



CBM sells \$12.4M, 38.7M Thai baht on 10 Oct

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) sold US\$12.4 million and 38.7 million Thai baht on 10 October, after its sales of over 660,000 yuan and over 10 million baht to those engaged in the private sector on 7 October.

CBM pumped US\$13.1 million and 288,000 yuan on 4 October, \$780,000, 1.2 million yuan, and one million baht on 3 October, and over 1.2 million yuan and 10.2 million baht into the financial market on 2 October.

CBM also injected over \$76 million, 86 million baht, and 4.8 million yuan into financial markets in September. Moreover, CBM sold over \$190 million, 19 million yuan, and 79 million baht in August.

CBM aims to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and the currency devaluation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March, it has been joining hands with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. — NN/KK

Myanmar ships 930,000 + tonnes of rice to international markets in H1 this FY

MYANMAR'S rice and broken rice exports exceeded 930,000 tonnes in the first half of the current financial year 2024-2025 beginning 1 April, with an estimated value of \$458 million, statistics of Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF) showed.

Myanmar exported over 900,000 tonnes through maritime trade channels and 20,000 tonnes at border posts.

The export volumes are 111,862 tonnes worth \$55 million in April, 71,279.5 tonnes worth \$36 million in May, 162,325.75 tonnes worth \$84 million in June, 165,444 tonnes worth \$81 million in July, 207,369 tonnes worth \$97 million in August and over 219,560 tonnes worth \$104 million in September respectively.

The federation aims to achieve 2.5 million tonnes of rice exports in the

2024-2025 financial year (April-March).

The Ministry of Commerce has been cooperating with departments and institutions concerned to achieve export targets and beyond depending on the supply volume of rice, broken rice, pulses, corn, rubber, and fisheries from the respective companies.

Ministry of Commerce is working together with the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry, Myanmar Rice Federation, Myanmar Pulses, Beans, Maize and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association, Myanmar Garment Manufacturers Association, Myanmar Industries Association, Myanmar Rubber Planters and Producers Association, Myanmar Fisheries Products Processors and Exporters Association to meet monthly export targets and facilitate exports.

The federation is projected to achieve 2.5 million tonnes of rice and broken rice export in the FY 2023-2024, generating earnings of one billion dollars. However, rice exports fell short of the target with 1.6 million tonnes worth \$845 million.

The Central Bank of Myanmar's monetary policy to control export earnings impeded rice exports, hurting exporters financially. The El Nino weather condition also hampered rice export, the chairperson of the Myanmar Rice Federation affirmed.

Myanmar exported 2,261,203 tonnes of rice and broken rice to foreign trade partners in the past 2022-2023 FY (April-March), with an estimated value of \$853.472 million. — NN/KK

Pesticide Registration Board revokes pesticide registration

THE Pesticide Registration Board announced that 11 types of pesticides were revoked, and 12 were deleted from registration. According to the meeting outcome of the 43rd meeting of the board held on 28 August, those 11 pesticides with expiry of more than six months and renewal failure were notified for revocation. ACH winter, migratory birds flock to Myanmar, seeking refuge in its natural environment. These birds tempo-rarily settle in lakes and wetlands like Inlay, Indawgyi, Moeyungyi, and Sunye, making the country an essential wintering destination.

To protect these seasonal visitors, successive governments in Myanmar have established wildlife sanctuaries, natural parks, Ramsar sites, and special habitats. 

As a regular reader of The Global New Light of Myanmar and an occasional contributor, I am writing to request the reinstatement of the Sunday Supplement (Sunday Special Section). This section was halted dur-



ing the COVID-19 period and hasn't yet returned. I have noticed the value of this supplement since my childhood. Back then, I had the privilege of reading grammar explanations by the renowned CTO (U Chit Thein Oo) on a weekly basis, and I cannot forget the gratitude I felt for being able to share that knowledge with my students when I first started teaching. I passed on those lessons for nearly a year.

That goes back to 1979, long before the newspaper was rebranded as The Global New Light of Myanmar. At that time, it was still known as The Working People's Daily. The GNLM is a well-established paper with a rich history, but I have missed the extra content from the supplement in recent years, especially since the pre-COVID days. The Sunday Supplement was becoming even more enjoyable with a mix of entertaining essays-around four each week. These gave a refreshing break from the usual local and international news. I found myself looking forward to my Sunday mornings, sipping a hot cup of coffee and indulging in those delightful reads.

Aside from the essays, the supplement also included grammar tips, which I cherished as a young learner. For the current generation of English learners, finding such content again in the Sunday Supplement would be truly beneficial. The insightful articles, accompanied by photos from across the nation, made the supplement something to anticipate eagerly. It's no exaggeration to say that it was a pleasure to see young writers showcasing their talent through essays that evoke emotions like joy, sadness, serenity, strength, and even frustration. The supplement helped clear our minds after a week full of news and kept us engaged with fresh perspectives.

Another important point is the platform it provides for young people aspiring to improve their English skills. Unfortunately, there are not many such platforms in Myanmar today. As it stands, GNLM is the only newspaper in Myanmar publishing in English. To draw a comparison with India, where English has flourished, many newspapers and magazines are still published in English. Although India gained independence from British rule not long before Myanmar, India has managed to not only preserve but also strengthen the legacy of the English language, which the British sowed. While I won't mention specific publications, it's clear that India's use of English remains strong. I recall that when I first graduated, The Guardian magazine was still being published in Myanmar, but it has since disappeared. Nevertheless, The Global New Light of Myanmar's Sunday Supplement was undoubtedly a valuable tool for young Myanmar learners of English.

I understand that increasing the number of pages would raise costs, and more editorial work would be needed to curate the articles. If these factors make it impossible to reintroduce the Sunday Supplement, I fully understand. However, if feasible, I kindly request that you and the other decision-makers reconsider reinstating it.

Yellow-breasted bunting spotted at Kyonkapyin-**Tapseik Wildlife Conservation Area**

THE presence of a rare species of the yellow-breasted bunting bird has been recorded in the Kyonkapyin-Tapseik Wildlife Conservation Area this year, said the Kyonkapyin-Tapseik Wildlife Conservation Group (KTCG).

It is initially known that the yellow-breasted bunting bird (critically endangered species - CR) has come to Myanmar and other neighbouring countries, where winter has come according to the cycle of the season.

The KTCG informed us that it has continued to record the presence of such rare birds in its area this year.

It has been seven years since the KTCG recorded this bird, and the population of this bird has been increasing not only in other world areas but also in Myanmar.

Thanks to suitable habitats around the Kyonkapyin-Tapseik Wildlife Conservation area, an abundance of food, and joint conservation of locals and surrounding villages, it has been found that the number of yellow-breasted bunting birds is increasing every year.

The KTCG, in cooperation with locals and experts, is carrying out regular censuses, collaborative conservation of their habitats, as well as the distribution of awareness posters on the conservation from their arrival until the time the yellow-breasted bunting birds return

Green investments could boost Finland's GDP: report

A report by the Confederation of Finnish Industries suggests that implementing just 20 per cent of Finland's planned green investment projects could boost the country's GDP by three billion euros annually and create 12,000 new jobs each year.

FINLAND'S gross domestic product (GDP) would see an annual increase of three billion euros (US\$3.29 billion) if just 20 per cent of the planned green investment projects were implemented, according to a report published by the Confederation of Finnish Industries (EK) on Tuesday.

The report highlights that nearly 270 billion euros worth of green transition projects are currently pending, with the

majority still in early planning stages. Analyzing the potential impact over the next 30 years, the report suggests that if 58 billion euros worth of projects — roughly 20 per cent of all the plans — were implemented, Finland's GDP would rise by approximately one per cent annually, accumulating to 96 billion euros in three decades.

In addition to GDP growth, the report projects an annual increase of 12,000 persons in employment and an extra 540 million euros in tax revenues each year.

Ulla Heinonen, EK's head of green growth, noted that these economic effects could be even higher if tax relief measures were introduced for green investments, along with regulatory reforms to streamline permit processes and boost Finland's competitiveness in the global market. The company also reported "significant increases in both revenue and profit" for international stores of casualwear giant Uniqlo. Fast Retailing - the world's third biggest clothing manufacturer and retailer after Zara owner Inditex and Sweden's H&M - reported a 25 per cent on-year jump in net profit to 371.9 billion yen (\$2.5 billion). The firm's earnings have hit new records for several years running since the Covid-19 pandemic eased as it pursues an aggressive international expansion strategy. Warm weather over the winter squeezed sales slightly for Uniqlo stores in Japan, famous for their down jackets. - AFP

One killed, 12 people trapped in Colorado gold mine

One person died and a dozen people remain trapped deep in a disused Colorado gold mine after the shaft's elevator system malfunctioned during a tour Thursday, local police said.

"We're just trying to keep down the worry of what's going on, so that nobody gets excited," added Mikesell.

The mine outside the small city of Cripple Creek, around 100 miles south of Denver, offers a chance to "Experience the 'Old West' as it was for hard rock gold miners of 'The World's Greatest Gold Camp," according to its official website.

During the Mollie Kathleen Gold Mine Tour, a mechanical failure in the elevator system resulted in one fatality and four minor injuries among visitors 1,000 feet underground. While 11 people were safely brought to the surface, 12 remain in a tunnel with a mine employee until the elevator is deemed safe. – AFP

Hurricane Milton death toll rises to 14

THE death toll from Hurricane Milton has risen to at least 14 after another fatality was reported in Hillsborough County, which includes Tampa, CNN reported.

A woman in her late 70s lost her life while working on post-hurricane restoration efforts when a large tree branch fell on her. This incident occurred shortly after 11:00 am ET on Thursday, as stated in a news release from the city.

"Although the storm has passed, its devastation has tragically taken the life of one of our community members," said Tampa Police Chief Lee Bercaw. "Our thoughts are with the family as they grieve their loved one."

More than 2.9 million utility customers across Florida were without power. The storm made landfall as a Category 3 hurricane, down from the initial Category 5, according to a report by Al Jazeera.

Twenty-five people have been rescued from a mobile home park in St Lucie County that left six dead, the county Sheriff Keith Pearson told CNN. – ANI

Global anti-piracy body calls for continued vigilance off Somalia coastline despite falling attacks



INTERNATIONAL Maritime Bureau (IMB), a global anti-piracy body, has emphasized the need for continued vigilance, despite a sharp decline in piracy attacks off the Somalia coastline during the first nine months of 2024.

The IMB said in the latest report available to Xinhua that three vessels were hijacked, two were boarded and fired upon, and one reported an attempted approach in the waters off Somalia and the Gulf of Aden in the period. "IMB has not received reports of any maritime piracy incidents from vessels transiting these waters between July and September, possibly due to the prevalence of monsoons," said the report.

The IMB Piracy Reporting Centre (PRC) cautioned vessel owners and operators against complacency, highlighting that recent incidents demonstrate Somali pirates' continued capability to target ships more than 1,000 nautical miles from the

Somali coast.

While the IMB continues to monitor the situation, it noted although only eight Somali piracy incidents were recorded, several hijackings of dhows and fishing boats may have gone unreported. The anti-piracy watchdog advised all vessels to comply with the latest maritime regulations while transiting the area. — Xinhua

Kim Sei-young sets new tournament record at LPGA Shanghai

SOUTH Korean major champion Kim Sei-young topped the leaderboard after the first round at the 2024 Buick LPGA Shanghai here on Thursday, setting a new single-round tournament record with a remarkable 10-under-par score of 62.

Kim's brilliant round included nine birdies and an eagle, offset by just a single bogey. "I really enjoy playing in China and always feel welcomed here. The environment helps me stay relaxed, which is probably why I often perform well in China," said the 12-time LPGA champion.

Despite experiencing shoulder discomfort during her pre-round warm-up, Chinese golfer He Muni chose to compete and delivered an impressive performance, finishing tied for fourth place with a 6-under 66, the best result of the opening day among the Chinese players.

"It's my fourth consecutive week of competition, and I feel the strain, but I've kept my expectations low, which helps me relax," said He, who aims for good results. Chinese veteran Lin Xiyu and defending champion Angel Yin both carded 5-under 67, tying for eighth

place.



Kamada says Japan can close in on World Cup place against Australia

Argentina held, Brazil leave it late in 2026 World Cup qualifiers


ARGENTINA were held to a 1-1 draw by Venezuela on Lionel Messi's return as Brazil got their 2026 World Cup qualifying campaign back on track with a last-gasp 2-1 victory over Chile on Thursday.

Messi, who missed Argentina's last round of fixtures in September due to injury, looked to have put the world champions on course for victory after his free-kick helped set up Nicolas Otamendi's 13th-minute opener in the Venezuelan city of Maturin.

But a battling performance by Venezuela in front of their home fans was rewarded midway through the second half when veteran striker Salomon Rondon met Yeferson Soteldo's cross with a header that flew past Argentina goalkeeper Geronimo Rulli. Despite the dropped points, 2022 World Cup winners Argentina remain firmly on course for a place at the 2026 finals, which are being staged in the United States, Canada and Mexico. In the expanded 48-team tournament, the top six from South America's qualifiers will qualify for the finals. Argentina leads with 19 points, while Brazil struggles, recently trailing 1-0 to Chile after Eduardo Vargas scored early against them. - AFP

Japan's atomic bomb survivors group wins Nobel Peace Prize

JAPAN'S leading organization of atomic bomb survivors, Nihon Hidankyo, won the 2024 Nobel Peace Prize on Friday, marking a milestone for the group that has campaigned over the years for the abolition of nuclear weapons.

The group, founded in 1956, was awarded the prize "for its efforts to achieve a world free of nuclear weapons and for demonstrating through witness testimony that nuclear weapons must never be used again," the Norwegian Nobel Committee said. It is the second time a Japanese person or organization has received the Nobel Peace Prize since 1974 when it was given to former Prime Minister Eisaku Sato, who introduced Japan's three non-nuclear principles of not possessing, producing or allowing nuclear weapons on its territory.

"The extraordinary efforts of Nihon Hidankyo and other representatives of the Hibakusha have contributed greatly to the establishment of the nuclear taboo.

"It is therefore alarming that today this taboo against the use of nuclear weapons is under pressure," the committee

POWER LINES VULNERABLE

France's City of Light switches to climate-resilient power cables

TO maintain the glow of the City of Light, Paris is modernizing its underground electric cables, vulnerable to damage during heatwaves and dating back 60 years. With power cables melting from Portland to Sicily, the world's 80 million kilometres (50 million miles) of power lines are largely unprepared to resist extreme temperatures, scientists have warned. The French capital over the next few months will be replacing its obsolete paper-insulated lead-covered cables (PILC), which are made of oil-impregnated paper encased in a lead sheath.

Enedis is replacing Paris's outdated

paper-insulated cables with modern plastic ones to improve resilience against heat. This upgrade responds to increasing climate challenges and rising temperatures affecting cable reliability worldwide. – AFP
